4. Overview of the Research Project (About 150 words) Note: If you have changed your project since the time of application submission, please write clearly where you made changes.

This research project has been undertaken jointly by the Sainsbury Institute for the Study of Japanese Arts and Cultures (SISJAC) and the Art Research Center, Ritsumeikan University (ARC). It is creating a pilot project centred on the construction of a portal site for an online open access database that will make accessible research materials in UK collections. In parallel, the project seeks to enhance research networking among curators in UK museums with Japanese collections.

SISJAC and the University of East Anglia (UEA) have established a new MA programme started in September 2020. The development of an online catalogue will provide opportunities for our students to be involved in the creation of a cutting-edge resource and help to foster relationships with leading museum collections in UK, providing a state-of-the-art resource for research and teaching. This should lead us to a richer, more powerful understanding of the emergence of Japanese arts and cultures.

An essential part of this project is engagement with young researchers, who are taking part in the digitisation and cataloguing processes along with more experienced scholars. This arrangement provides those young researchers with first-hand experience in handling original artworks. The project conducted a research assistantship programme in joint collaboration with the British Museum (conducted by Yano Akiko) from January to February 2022 for 6 weeks in total at the British Museum and the Victoria & Albert Museum. We are hoping to continue this programme in future years, based on the great positive feedback we received from the candidates this year.

The project also continued to work on developing our own collection database. Three selected assistants from the University of East Anglia and Norwich Castle Museum helped to add metadata for a SISJAC archival database and the auction catalogue database.
