4. Overview of the Research Project (About 150 words) Note: If you have changed your project since the time of application submission, please write clearly where you made changes.

Building on the continuing research partnership between the Art Research Center (ARC) and the British Museum (BM) in the past fifteen years, we conducted a digitisation project, aiming 1) to facilitate the public's digital access to the British Museum's Japanese collection images and 2) to support the ongoing international research project begun in February 2022 'Creative Collaborations: Salons and Networks in Kyoto and Osaka 1780-1880', led by the Principal Investigators Akama and Yano. The focus of the digitisation was on the painted works in the BM collection by the Maruyama-Shijo artists in Edo-period Kyoto and Osaka.

The initial plan was to invite two staff members from the ARC to the BM to digitise 100 hanging scrolls and 80 albums. However, the Covid-19 restrictions in the UK hindered their visit. An alternative plan was promptly proposed and facilitated by Matsuba by employing graduate students in Japanese studies at the University of East Anglia and SOAS University of London. To accommodate graduate students' level of digitisation skills and experience, the hanging scrolls were replaced by handscrolls while albums remained as planned.

The digitisation has been successfully conducted despite the various difficulties posed by the Covid-19 restrictions. The fact that the ARC, BM and Sainsbury Institute for the Study of Japanese Arts and Cultures (SISJAC) amongst themselves maintain long-term research partnerships has made it possible for us to make changes necessitated by the pandemic swiftly and flexibly. The ARC and SISJAC are in partnership in training graduate students in the UK in digitisation. The BM and ARC are in digitisation partnership. The BM and SISJAC collaborate as two of the major UK centres of Japanese studies.

For 15 days over 6 weeks in January and February 2022, at the British Museum, the photography of in total 24 titles of handscrolls (29 items) and 91 titles of albums (107 items) was completed as expected. The image data have been processed at the ARC, and the digital images are due to be delivered to the BM, which will then be uploaded onto the Museum's internal database. Subsequently, the images will be shown on the Collection Online for public use as well as on the ARC's portal database.

As a result of the plan change, this project was able to serve as an educational opportunity for the graduate students in Japanese cultural studies in the UK. The students, supervised by Matsuba, worked hard. They appeared to appreciate having a hands-on experience with museum objects, putting in practice what they have learnt in training.
