<p>This ARC application is for a grant to digitize the unrecorded Scott Johnson collection of nearly 2000 <i>kamigata surimono</i> that is essential to our larger project, because they contain records of poetry salon gatherings. The larger plan is for a three-year international project among twenty researchers in the UK, USA, Europe and Japan examining the activities of cultural salons and networks in Japan, 1750-1900, focusing on the visual arts produced in Kyoto and Osaka. The main research corpus comprises paintings, prints and illustrated books in the British Museum, Kansai University and two private collections in Japan. Combining art and literature research methodologies with digital humanities technologies, the key aims of the project are to analyse the role of art in a wider society, to create a sustainable open database of artworks and artist/producer names available for research, to host exhibitions in London and Kyoto, and to produce significant publications.</p>

<p>This was the first stage of a larger project to digitalize and set up an archive database of the Scott Johnson <i>kamigata surimono</i> collection as part of a project on <i>kamigata</i> art salons.</p> <p>Professor Akama and his team at Ritsumeikan Art Research Center successfully photographed the entire collection and set up the Scott Johnson <i>surimono</i> database (<a href="https://www.dh-jac.net/db/nishikie/search_sj.php">https://www.dh-jac.net/db/nishikie/search_sj.php</a>).</p> <p>1906 <i>Surimono</i> in total</p>
