Synopsis:

This international workshop explores the natures and functions of gadai (pictorial theme or subject matter) and the relationships between the visual art and literature, taking an interdisciplinary approach. In the Japanese visual tradition, numerous works consist of pictorializations of Chinese and Japanese literary themes. Among them, there are works that clearly represent the sequence of time by depicting the same figure repeatedly in the visual representation, such as emaki (picture scrolls) that accompany the kotobagaki text. On the other hand, there are works that hardly show any sequence of time but an educated audience would understand its literary source, such as uta-e (a picture representing the contents of a waka poem) and gashu-mono (elegant gatherings of Chinese scholars). The issues of what caused these differences remain unsolved. What constitutes the formation of particular painting themes? Who were the artists and the patrons/consumers of these narrative pictures? Under what circumstances were they produced? Our goal is to rearticulate the socio-political, religio-cultural and ideological importance of pictorial themes based on literary sources. Specialists from various fields of study belonging to research institutions in the US, Canada, Israel and Japan will gather to advance these issues from multiple perspectives.
