This symposium aims to discuss the global entanglements of textile pattern designs with an emphasis on *katagami* (Japanese stencils), batik, sarasa, and 'African Prints' between 1800 and 2000. While some of the historical relationships among these designs have received scholarly attention, the symposium provides an opportunity to rethink these relationships by considering Japan's position and roles in this global design circulation and related entanglements. The symposium therefore focuses on not only the global history of textile designs and techniques but also the various agents, such as textile manufactures, designers, traders, and local consumers as well as their economic, social, and cultural exchanges.
